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OUR KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Group Captain Jez Attridge OBE MSc RAF

Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force Coningsby

Jez Attridge flew the Panavia Tornado F3 policing the No Fly Zone over Bosnia and on the UK's Quick Reaction Alert duty in Scotland and the Falkland Islands. On a three-year exchange with the United States Marine Corps, he flew the McDonnell Douglas F/A-18 Hornet from the USS Abraham Lincoln and USS John C Stennis.

Posted to 3(F) Squadron, the first RAF Eurofighter Typhoon unit (and honorary member of the Midlands Aerospace Alliance), he oversaw the squadron's activation and Typhoon's first overseas deployment. Assuming command of No XI Squadron, he was deployed to support Operation ELLAMY over Libya, in the Typhoon's operational debut in both the air-to-air and air-to-surface roles. Both squadrons are based at RAF Coningsby in Lincolnshire.

Since 2014, Jez has been Station Commander, RAF Coningsby – where 3,000 personnel work. He is Hurricane and Spitfire qualified – the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight is located at Coningsby – and in 2015 featured in the BBC Two documentary series *Britain's Ultimate Pilots: Inside the RAF*.



David Bailey

Professor of Industrial Strategy, Aston Business School

Prof Bailey is a specialist on economic restructuring and industrial policy with particular expertise in UK and West Midlands car manufacturing.

As an author, media commentator and newspaper columnist, David has commented on key economic and regional policy issues. Recently, he has undertaken European-funded research on using foreign investment to upgrade clusters, and on industrial and regional policy and the rise of 'phoenix' industries such as the low carbon vehicles cluster in the West Midlands.

He has worked with SQW Consulting on a project for the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) on developing a framework to assist Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) in responding to economic 'shocks' and restructuring.



Marcus Bryson CBE

Chairman for Aerospace, UK Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS), and Chairman, Aerospace Growth Partnership

After a 30-year career in aerospace,
Marcus joined BIS this January to chair
its Aerospace hub, a new role to promote
exports and inward investment into the UK industry.

Marcus retired as chief executive of GKN
Aerospace at the end of 2015. He had joined the
company with its acquisition of Westland in 1994.
Since 2006, he had been chief executive and a
member of the executive committee. He was
appointed to the board of GKN plc in 2007.

Marcus served as president of ADS in 2014-15, and continues as co-chairman of the Aerospace Growth Partnership (AGP).

He was awarded a CBE in June 2014 in recognition of his services to aerospace.



David Danger

Managing Director, UTC Aerospace Systems – Marston Aerospace

David joined United Technologies in 2008 and is managing director of Marston Aerospace, which employs 350 people in Wolverhampton and 100 people in Kalisz, Poland. The business designs, tests and manufactures heat exchangers and fluid management products for the aerospace and motorsport industries.

Prior to joining United Technologies, David spent more than 20 years in manufacturing and management positions in aerospace, automotive and construction materials with Federal-Mogul, GKN plc and Saint-Gobain.

He has a degree in engineering from University of Cambridge and an MBA from University of Sunderland. He is a chartered engineer, a fellow of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and a director of the Midlands Aerospace Alliance.

Jim Godman

Vice-President, Engineering Function, GKN Aerospace, and Chairman, NATEP South West Regional Advisory Panel

Jim has wide experience of leading and building successful cross-sectoral teams with government, academia, industry and the wider public sector, building on service in the military, public and private sectors.

In addition to his role at GKN, he is a UK Government national judge for the Make it in Great Britain campaign, chairman of the South West Regional Advisory Panel (SWRAP) for NATEP, chairman for two years of the National Composite Centre (NCC) and a fellow of the Royal Aeronautical Society.

Passionate about engineering, Jim is also trying to make a film, Cody the Movie, and to establish the Engineering Oscars (EOs) to celebrate the creators in society.



Paul Kahn

President, Airbus Group UK, and President, ADS

As president of Airbus Group UK, Paul is responsible for the UK business, providing leadership, oversight and coordination of Airbus Group's activities and strategy in the UK. He is also responsible for the development of the Group's strategic industrial partnerships within the UK, key customer relationships, and enhancing Airbus Group's relationship with the British government.

Paul was appointed a UK Business Ambassador in November 2015 and became president of ADS, the UK's aerospace, defence, security and space trade body, in January 2016.

A chartered engineer with an MBA from London Business School, he joined the group from Thales in 2014, bringing extensive international senior management experience in the aerospace, defence and transportation industries.



Jeegar Kakkad Chief Economist and Director of Policy, ADS

Jeegar joined ADS in 2013 in his current position, where he manages the policy, media and government affairs team. He joined from Jaguar Land Rover (JLR), where he was UK Government Affairs manager leading tax, regulatory and supply chain finance campaigning and managed JLR's political visits programme.

Before that, he was a senior economist at EEF, leading macroeconomic forecasting and innovation, taxation and enterprise policy lobbying.

Jeegar also worked at The Social Market Foundation, a London-based think tank, and at The Brookings Institution, in Washington DC. Jeegar holds degrees in economics from

Princeton University and in economic policy from the London School of Economics.



Andy Page

Chief Executive, Sharing in Growth UK, and Chair, NATEP National Steering Board

Andy Page spent more than 25 years with Rolls-Royce in senior engineering and supply chain management roles, including purchase director for Rolls-Royce's German division. His early career was in military aerospace in roles including chief engineer for the RB199 engine for the Panavia Tornado and project executive for Helicopters.

He currently heads Sharing in Growth, a £250m programme of intensive supplier development, supported by Rolls-Royce and the Regional Growth Fund, to help accelerate growth in the aerospace sector.

He is also chair of the National Aerospace Technology Exploitation Programme (NATEP) steering board and a member of the national SC21 steering committee.

Rosie Toogood

Executive Vice-President, Compressor Components, Rolls-Royce

Rosie joined Rolls-Royce in 1992 and became executive vice-president Compressor Components in June 2015.

Early in her career, she worked in Indirect Purchasing and Rolls-Royce's Nuclear business. She spent three years in Berlin as programme director for the V2500 engine, followed by five years in the Controls Supply Chain unit where she led the Purchasing organisation. She then joined the Civil Large Engines business as programme director for the Trent 900 engine. Prior to her current position, she was executive vice-president Purchasing.

She holds an honours degree in chemistry with materials from Liverpool University and an MBA with distinction from Birmingham University. She is also a chartered accountant.



Oliver Towers

President, GE Aviation Dowty Propellers and Chairman, AGP Strategy Working Group

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Oliver was appointed to his current role in 2015, which includes product responsibility for Dowty Propellers and Hamble

Aerostructures in the UK, and GE Aviation's Santa Ana operation in the USA. He has been president of Dowty Propellers since 2008. Prior to that he was vice-president Strategy & Customer Accounts for GE Aviation Systems, a position that he previously held in Smiths Aerospace.

Before joining Smiths Aerospace, he held senior positions with Rolls-Royce in Europe and the USA. Oliver chairs the Strategy Working Group of the Aerospace Growth Partnership (AGP) and is president of the Gloucester and Cheltenham branch of the Royal Aeronautical Society.



Our venue

The Lloyds Bank Advanced Manufacturing **Training Centre**

The Lloyds Bank Advanced Manufacturing Training Centre (AMTC) is the latest showpiece facility to open on the Coventry campus of the Manufacturing Technology Centre (MTC).

The £40.5m centre opened last September with £18m of initial funding from the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS), to be matched by industry, to develop the next generation of manufacturing engineers and technicians.

Lloyds Banking Group pledged £1m a year to support its work. The AMTC hopes to develop more than 1,000 apprentices and trainees through the initial partnership with the bank.

The AMTC building is the UK's first national college, a flagship facility for advanced apprenticeship programmes. Its location next to the pioneering MTC links the development of world-class manufacturing technology with the development of people.

The AMTC is also making a name as a state-ofthe-art conference venue with lecture theatres, meeting and exhibition spaces, all supported by cutting-edge technology.
